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




Safeguarding Our Students' Health: Regular Head-Lice Checks



At Nada International School, we prioritize the health and well-being of our students. As part of our comprehensive Health and Safety Program, we conduct regular head-lice checks to ensure a lice-free environment that promotes optimal health and learning. These checks are conducted twice every term to proactively identify and address any potential head-lice infestations. Our trained staff discreetly and respectfully examines each student's hair, maintaining their privacy and dignity throughout the process. Head lice is a common social and health problem among all age groups, which can be developed by pediculus humanu capitis as a human head louse.

Pediculosis is considered a contagious disease among school -children. Head lice is especially widespread among school-aged children. They are easiest to see at the nape of the neck and over the ears.

Spreading of lice is more commonly due to direct contact with the hair of infested people. Other common routes are reported such as clothing, objects, and personal belongings of infested persons. Untreated pediculosis can result in itching, hives, secondary infection, and repeated wounding of the head.





To prevent the spreading of pediculosis from infested people to society, their families, and schools, treatment and follow-up of head lice infestations are very important.

We encourage parents to continue these checks at home and to promptly inform the school nurse if they detect any signs of head lice. Early detection and treatment are essential for preventing the spread of head lice and ensuring the well-being of our students.

Our commitment to the health and safety of our students goes beyond head-lice checks. We also provide regular health education sessions, promote healthy habits, and maintain a clean and hygienic school environment.

Together, we can create a healthy and supportive learning environment where our students can thrive.














The Grade 3 Boys enjoyed their Science lesson with a change of scenery being outdoors and also in our Science Laboratory. Students learned about melting and solidifying.

In conclusion, have fun right now at school and try not to regret a lot of things otherwise you won't look back on it very fondly. That's all from me. Don't forget to drink your water.



They used a Redox indicator in their investigation, which changes color from blue to colorless when it gets oxidised.


They selected a range of temperatures and measured the color change in a given period of time. The results produced by them were beautiful, amazing, and self explanatory.











